GENERAL REGULATIONS

1. Exhibitors of animals, machinery in motion and other exhibits liable to occasional accidents, injury or damage to persons coming in contact with them shall guard their exhibits and protect the public from coming in contact therewith, and every such exhibitor does hereby indemnify the Exhibition from and against all claims, demands, costs, charges and expenses which it may incur, suffer, or be put to by reason of any accident, or of any persons being injured or suffering damage through or by reason of any such exhibit not being properly guarded, or the public not being properly protected there from.
2. The Exhibition, its employees, agents or servants, shall not be liable for any loss to an exhibitor, his or her employees, agents or servants, or any animals or articles on display, which may be occasioned by fire, accident, condition of structure or the negligence of other exhibitors or officials or otherwise howsoever.
3. The Exhibition will be open to the public on Wednesday September 6th through Saturday Sept 9th from 9:00am to 12:00 midnight and Sunday, September 10th 9am to 5pm.
4. **All exhibitors must leave exhibits in the Exhibition until 5:00pm Sunday night unless otherwise stated in this book. Otherwise they are to forfeit all prize money and could be denied future entry.**
5. **Out of province exhibitors may leave 2 hours prior to the last ferry boat departure time on Sunday night.**
6. The grounds and buildings will be open for exhibitors on Monday and will remain open during the afternoon and evening for the reception and arrangement of articles and animals.
7. Exhibitors, on arrival, will report to the office of the Manager, who with the appropriate committee will allot space for their exhibits.
8. All exhibits must be in place by 9:00am on Wednesday unless otherwise stated in this list.
9. All expenses for the conveyance of articles and animals to and from the Exhibition shall be borne by the Exhibitor.

10. Exhibitors must procure for themselves proper fastenings for safely securing animals in their stalls.
11. All committee chairpersons are responsible to see that their buildings, stalls and exhibits are clean & neat during the exhibition and are left clean upon departure.
12. No exhibitor shall receive more than two prizes in any one section, livestock excepted. However, there is no restriction on the number of entries by any one Exhibitor unless otherwise stated.
13. The management and committees reserve the right to prescribe and regulate all matters pertaining to the harmony and attractiveness of the Exhibition.
14. Any person who attempts to interfere with the judges while in the discharge of their duties, or who attempts to influence their decision by his presence or remarks, or who afterwards uses any contemptuous or abusive language in consequence of any award made, shall forfeit his or her right to any prizes in which he or she may otherwise be entitled, and may otherwise be dealt with as management may determine.
15. Prize money may be reduced up to 50% at the discretion of the Directors in the event of reduced income on account of bad weather or other reasons.
16. Entry fees constitute a portion of the prize money.
17. No one under 18 is permitted on or driving a horse without a helmet while on exhibition grounds.
19. All cows/calves/sheep/pigs (recorded) must have proper identification tags.
20. To ensure the safety and well-being of employees, participants, guest and livestock, the Pictou North Colchester Exhibition under the direction of the Pictou Agricultural Society has adopted a policy in accordance with the Protection of Property Act (herein referred to as the PPA) for the Province of Nova Scotia.

A person or persons who act in a way contrary to “keeping the peace and good order” shall be dealt with quickly and served notice under the PPA and shall be banned from entering, or being on the grounds of the Pictou Agricultural Society, including all parking area, camping areas, exhibition grounds and Hector Arena.

The term of exclusion will be the decision of the President of the Pictou Agricultural Society and/or their representative. Standard exclusion shall be six (6) months or one (1) year.

A PPA notice shall be signed by the President of the Pictou Agricultural Society and /or their representative in two(2) copies, copy one shall be served on the offender and copy two shall remain in the control of the Society and presented to the Royal Canadian Mounted Police as needed.

A PPA notice shall be served on a person or persons who:

- Enter the grounds illegally, either during exhibition without paying entrance fee or after hours
- Cause a disturbance or act in an unsafe or unacceptable behavior in accordance with the policies laid down by management. Management’s decisions shall be final.
- Disrupt any event, use profane language
- Use any non-prescription drug or use alcohol
- Fail to follow direction of security staff or event staff
- Cause harm or distress to any animal on the fair grounds

A PPA notice shall be served for any of the above infractions, or any activity that is in the decision of management contrary to “keeping the peace and good order”.

2. Horse and Cattle Exhibitors will be entitled to free five-day passes according to the following scale **1 pass per animal up to a maximum of 4 passes per entry**. If entitled to a free pass, exhibitors may purchase an additional five-day pass at \$10.00 for each free pass.
3. Eligible 4-H members and leaders with 4-H cards have free admission on 4-H day.

PARKING

1. No vehicles will be allowed on the main exhibition grounds without a vehicle pass which must be purchased from the exhibition office at a cost of \$6.00 each.
2. No vehicle passing through the gates will be permitted to carry passengers.
3. Vehicle passes will permit vehicles to enter the main Exhibition grounds until 12:00 noon only. All vehicles must be removed from the grounds by noon and parked in a DESIGNATED AREA.
4. No empty trucks and trailers can be parked on the main Exhibition grounds without the permission of the Manager. A suitable area will be set aside for these vehicles.
5. **All trucks, trailers or campers used for living accommodations must register at the Manager's office and will receive a designated lot. ALL TRAILERS ARE PARKED AT THE OWNER'S RISK.**

EXHIBITIONS ASSOCIATION OF NOVA SCOTIA CODE OF ETHICS FOR EXHIBITORS OF LIVESTOCK AT EXHIBITIONS AND FAIRS IN NOVA SCOTIA

Exhibitors of livestock at exhibitions and fairs in Nova Scotia shall at all times deport themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their conduct in this competitive and showmanship environment shall always reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity to promote the advancement of agricultural awareness and education. This code applies to all livestock entered and/or offered in any event at fairs and exhibitions. Owners, exhibitors, trainers and all responsible persons who violate the code of ethics will forfeit premiums, awards and entry fees and may be prohibited from future fairs and exhibitions in accordance with the rules adopted by the respective fairs and exhibitions in Nova Scotia. Exhibitors who violate this code of ethics negatively impact on the integrity of all livestock exhibitors and may be prohibited from entry and/or offered competition at all livestock shows in Nova Scotia.

The following is a list of guidelines for all exhibitions and fairs in Nova Scotia:

1. Any liquid or substance not considered part of an accepted or normal diet for livestock is deemed illegal and inhumane (for example: the use of alcoholic, carbonated or caffeinated beverages or chocolate flavored nutritional supplements).
2. Any time after an animal arrives on the fair or exhibitions site or premises, all treatments involving the use of drugs and/or medication for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal shall be administered by a licensed veterinarian upon notification to the manager of the fair or exhibition.
3. The use of showing and/or handling practices or devices such as striking animals to cause swelling, using electrical contrivance or other similar practices are not acceptable and are prohibited.
4. The application of this code of ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by the owner, exhibitor or participant whether or not he or she was actually instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this code of ethics.
5. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner/exhibitor to have the fair or exhibition take disciplinary action for violation of this code of ethics, and any other rules of the fair or exhibition, without recourse against the fair or exhibition.
6. The Exhibition Association of Nova Scotia, in working with the livestock associations that use the fairs and exhibitions facilities will conduct random drug testing as a credible deterrent to the use of performance enhancing drugs. A policy will be developed applicable to the cost of the tests and recommendations on the penalties.

EACH EXHIBITOR MUST PAY \$5 PER HORSE FOR DRUG TESTING PRIOR TO PULLING.

PROOF OF LIABILITY INSURANCE MUST BE PROVIDED WITH ENTRY.

RULES:

1. All Horses will be subject to drug testing. **NO DRUGS ARE TO BE ALLOWED.**
2. If any team becomes unmanageable or difficult to handle, and in the opinion of the Judge and the Fair Committee becomes dangerous to the public, it will be disqualified and ordered to be taken from the pull area.
3. Light Teams to weigh up to 3000 lbs; Medium Teams to weigh 3001 to 3500 lbs; Heavy Teams 3501 lbs and over.
4. All teamsters to pull light to heavy draw for pulling position. Draw to take place during the meeting at the scales prior to the pull.
5. PULLING DISTANCE: 12 feet. Two starts are allowed to move the load the 12 feet. Teams must stay hooked to the drag between starts. In case of breakage of harness or equipment the team will drop to the end of the round.
6. Lines are to be used, 14ft apart for teams and 19ft for 3 abreast. Any horse of any team stepping over the white line during a start will lose that start. Any team having 2 errors will be disqualified.
7. Teams will pull round robin style.
8. a) 3 MINUTES TO COMPLETE THE PULL.
b) **MUST BE HOOKED WITHIN THE 1ST 2 MIN OR THE NEXT TEAM WILL BE CALLED.**
c) **YOUR TIME WILL START WHEN THE BOTTLE IS SET**
d) **THE DRAG WILL BE SET FOR THE LAST 2 TEAMS AND POSITIONED BY THE JUDGE AND COMMITTEE.**
e) **ONLY ONE WARNING FOR GOING EXCESSIVE DISTANCE WITH THE DRAG.**
9. Any teamster judged to be under the influence of liquor will not be allowed to compete. No whips allowed with horses. No slashing or overhand whipping will be allowed. **ABSOLUTELY NO TOUCHING THE HORSES ONCE IN FORWARD MOTION ON THE DRAG. IF YOU DO, YOU LOSE THAT ANIMAL NO CRUELTY WILL BE TOLERATED ON THE EXHIBITION GROUNDS TO ANY ANIMAL. NO PROFANE LANGUAGE OR VERBAL ABUSE WILL BE USED DURING CONTESTS OR YOU WILL BE DISQUALIFIED. NO DRAGGING SPREADERS ON THE GROUND ON THE FAIRGROUNDS AND MUST BE CARRIED IN THE ARENA.**
10. The drag will be pulled both ways by the horses and will be repositioned with the tractors at the discretion of the judge, if conditions warrant.
11. Everyone gets an extra free start in the 1st round if required.
12. Concerning all teams: If any horse of any team be so blemished or in poor condition, the judge and the committee shall have the right to eliminate that team.
13. Only one teamster to a team, but two helpers are allowed when hooking to the drag and in case of breakage or accident. Once the team is hooked to the drag, **THE HELPERS MUST MOVE TO THE REAR. TEAMSTERS AND HELPERS MUST BE NEATLY DRESSED.**
14. Any bunting of the drag of more than 3" during a pull will be counted as a start.
15. Drag will be set at the discretion of the judge.
16. **ANY TEAMSTER WITH GRIEVANCE MUST ADDRESS THE JUDGE HIMSELF.**
17. **MINIMUM STARTING LOAD FOR TEAMS:**
Heavy Draft - 4500lbs
Medium Draft - 3500lbs
Light Draft - 2500lbs

- 18 Teams will be weighed.
19. Winner will be the team pulling the heaviest load.
20. IN ALL CASES THE DECISION OF THE JUDGE IS FINAL.
21. Additional sponsor money will be divided equally.

Rules and Regulations of the Draft Horse Show

1. Proof of Liability Insurance Must Be Provided With Entry Forms! All drivers and handlers must be insured.
2. All fees entry fees MUST accompany entry forms. Entry closing date is August 29th.
3. All animals are asked to be in their stalls by 9:00 AM Wednesday and must remain on the grounds until 5:00PM on Sunday. Any exhibitor who leaves before 5:00PM Sunday will forfeit all prize money and may be denied entry the following year. Horses shown in line classes only may haul in and out.
4. All exhibits should display sign stating the Exhibitors name and address. Exhibitors are responsible for maintaining the cleanliness of their stall during the Exhibition. All prize money will be forfeited if stalls are left unclean at the end of the show.
5. Horses shown in Line classes only MUST be hauled in and out if stabling is not available.
6. The PNCEX Draft Horse Division cannot be held responsible for any loss or injury to horses and/or riders and/or tack and equipment.
7. If insufficient entries are received for any class/section, the section may be cancelled or combined at the discretion of the committee. Exhibitors will be notified in advance.
8. In all pure-bred classes, the name and number of animals must be given on the entry form. No horse shall be allowed to compete as pure-bred unless registered, except animals under one year of age, in which case name and registration of sire and dam must be given.
9. The driver of the hitch for the Four and Six Horse Driving Competition must have driven the same hitch in the respective hitch class.
10. In all multiple team hitches (more than 2 horses), the driver must be accompanied by a capable insured driver assistant on the wagon.
11. In Junior Driving classes, the driver must be accompanied by a capable insured driver. Juniors are to be 16 years of age and under and must wear a helmet.
12. Ladies Cart Class is open to Ladies over 16 years of age and must be accompanied by a properly dressed header when lined up in the ring.
13. All competitions must be held in fenced or enclosed area and every effort will be made to ensure safe hitching and assembly area.
14. Trailer hook-ups and exhibitor passes must be obtained at the main office. If a trailer hook up is required please indicate on the entry form.
15. Any problem arising that is not covered by the above rules or the general rules will be handled by the committee.

16. DRAFT HORSE FEES:

- Entry Fee per Horse \$15.00
 - Trailer Parking & Hook-up..... \$10/day or \$40/week
 - Vehicle Pass (allows vehicle on grounds until 12 noon).... \$6.00
- Horse Exhibitors will be entitled to one free exhibitor’s pass per animal entered to a maximum of four passes. If entitled to free pass, exhibitors may purchase an additional five day pass at \$10.00 for each free pass received.

The 2017 Light Horse Show will run September 6th – 10th, 2017. Classes will run from Wednesday evening until Sunday at 3:00pm (combination of indoors and outdoors). Light Horse haul out time will begin at 5:00pm Sunday.

Rules & Regulations of the Pictou & North Colchester Exhibition Light Horse Show

1. **Proof of NSEF Liability Insurance Must Be Provided With Entry Forms!**
2. All fees for entries & stalls MUST accompany entry forms. **NO PHONE ENTRIES, PLEASE. NO POSTDATED CHEQUES, PLEASE!** Entries are to be posted-marked no later than August 31st or a \$20 late fee will be charged. Please see Light Horse Chairperson when you arrive on the grounds to enter any additional classes. All post entries must be paid for at least one hour before the class is scheduled or you will NOT be permitted to enter. **NO EXCEPTIONS!** The fee for post entries is \$5 per class.
3. It is advisable that all entrants be immunized within the last six months and at least one month prior to the show. Any animal which appears ill in the opinion of a Veterinarian will be asked to leave the grounds.
4. Entry fees will be refunded upon receipt of valid doctor's or veterinarian's certificate.
5. Ponies will be considered as being 14.2hh and under; horses will be considered as being 14.3 hh and over.
6. Horses showing in Stake Classes must be shown in at least two other classes in that division.
7. Stalls will be assigned on a first-paid, first-served basis, according to the order of entries received up to entry deadline. Horses shown in Line classes only MUST be hauled in and out if stabling is not available. There will not be any tack stalls available. Light Horse box stalls are limited – please enter early in order to guarantee a stall.
8. **All prize money will be forfeited if stalls are left unclean at the end of the show.**
9. The PNCE Light Horse Division cannot be held responsible for any loss or injury to horses and/or riders and/or equipment and tack.
10. Exhibitors are expected to be on time for classes. THE SCHEDULE IS A GUIDE ONLY AND SUBJECT TO CHANGE. However, light horse classes will NOT be run before their scheduled time. If tack change is necessary, PLEASE notify the Ring Master beforehand. DELAYS WILL NOT BE TOLERATED.

11. AS A COURTESY, please inform a member of the Light Horse Division and the light horse Announcer if you are to scratch from a class. Refunds will not be given for scratches.
12. Any classes with fewer than three entries may be combined or cancelled.
13. Anyone interfering with the judge's decision (before, during or after a class) will forfeit all prize money and may be banned the following year. No exhibitor or family/friend may approach the judge directly with questions or comments. This may be done through the light horse Chairperson on behalf of the exhibitor.

14. **Ribbons will be awarded for 5 placings. Prize monies will be paid as follows:**

15. Owners of STALLIONS, PLEASE INDICATE ON ENTRY FORM. Stallions can only be shown/handled by an exhibitor 19 years of age or older. They cannot be shown in pony or youth classes.
16. NO MARTINGALES, TIE DOWNS OR DRAW REINS IN ANY DIVISION OTHER THAN GYMKHANA. In all western classes two hands may be used on ANY aged horse or pony with a snaffle bit or bosal. Any horses or ponies shown in a bit with a shank must be shown one handed (except gymkhana).
17. Senior exhibitors are those who will turn 19 in 2017. Youth exhibitors are those that will not reach their 19th birthday by the end of 2017. No one under 18 is permitted on a horse without a helmet while on the exhibition grounds.
18. No horse/pony can be ridden in the same class by more than one rider.
19. Points are accumulated by horse & rider entry. No points will be awarded to placing won by a different rider.
20. Trailer Hook-ups and Passes must be obtained at the Main Show Office. If a trailer hook-up is required please indicate on the entry form.

Division Rules

Senior – A horse class open to those riders who are or will turn 19 or older in 2017. Large ponies are also permitted but must only show in horse classes for the exhibition.

Youth – A horse/pony class open to those riders turning 18 years or younger in 2017. If you turn 19 in 2017 you are a senior.

Smallfry – open to those riders 12 & under as of January 1st of 2017 with horses or ponies.

Open Walk Trot – Open to senior and youth exhibitors with horses and ponies. The pair must not have competed in a loping class before. Both experienced riders with green horses and green riders with experienced horses are eligible. Walk & jog/trot only both ways of the ring.

Gymkhana – western equipment must be used. Long sleeve shirt and hats or helmets must be worn. Fall off a horse and/or going off pattern will result in disqualification from the heat. Disqualification will also occur if the horse crosses the finish line before the course is completed. Riders may not start their run until the gate is closed. Anyone doing so will be disqualified from the heat.

Maritime Bred - Open to horses whose sire and dam stood in the Maritimes at the time of its conception. Entries in this division must furnish proof of breeding.

Leadline – Open to riders 10 years of age & under as of January 1st of the current year. To be led by a person over the age of 16 years. Pony/horse to be led at a walk and jog/trot only. Rider & leader to be appropriately dressed. Pony/Horse to be judged on manners and suitability to leadline work. Rider to be judged on seat, hands, attire and neatness. English or Western attire.

Class List

Grooming and Conditioning: judged on the fitness and how well groomed the horse/pony is. The animal should be clean, with hooves well trimmed or shod. It is recommended that preference be given to the animal whose ears, muzzle, fetlocks and bridle path are clipped for showing. Manes and tails should be tangle free and may be banded or braided. The halter and lead should be clean and fit well.

Halter: A class where the horse/pony is judged upon its conformation. Emphasis is placed on well mannered individuals in the order of their resemblance to their breed ideal and that are the most positive combination of balance, structural correctness, and movement with appropriate breed and sex characteristics and adequate muscling. Animals will walk to the judge one at a time. As the horse/pony approaches, the judge will step to the right (left of the animal) to enable the horse/pony to trot straight to a cone placed 50 feet away. At the cone, the animal will continue trotting, turn to the left and trot towards the left wall or fence of the arena. After trotting, entries will be lined up head to tail for individual inspection by the judge. The judge will inspect each animal from both sides, front and rear. Grand and Reserve Champion Halter will be presented following Class #6.

Showmanship: Will be judged strictly on the exhibitor's ability to show a horse at halter. The horse/pony is merely a prop to demonstrate the ability and preparation of the exhibitor. The ideal showmanship performance consists of a poised, confident, neatly attired exhibitor leading a well groomed and conditioned horse that quickly and effectively performs the requested pattern with promptness, smoothness and precision. The showmanship class is not another halter class and should not be judged as such. It is mandatory that patterns be posted one hour before the class and they should be designed to test the showman's ability to effectively present a horse/pony to the judge

English Pleasure: To be shown at a flat footed walk, trot, extended trot, and easy canter both ways of the ring. Entries may be asked to halt and rein back as a group or individually. Entries should be suitably dressed for the class. Entries will be judged on performance with credit given to a flowing, balanced, and willing mount. The quality of movement and consistency of gaits is a major consideration.

Command: Entries shown at a walk, jog or trot, lope or canter and counter canter. An elimination class where the riders are required to do as the judge asks. Manner of performance could be a deciding factor.

Road Hack: Entries to be shown at a flat footed walk with a reasonable loose rein, trot, extended trot, easy canter and hand gallop both ways of the arena. Only 8 horses/ponies to gallop at one time and must be controlled. Entries may be asked to halt, rein back and stand quietly on a loose rein. Class will be judged on performance, manners, substance and conformation.

Equitation: An evaluation based on the ability of the rider to perform various maneuvers in harmony with his/her mount. The rider will be judged on seat, hands, legs and ability to control the horse/pony. Rail work may be required and consist of walk, trot, and canter both ways of the arena. Riders will be asked to perform individual work consisting of any maneuvers the judge feels necessary to determine the rider's equitation. Pattern will be posted at least one hour before the class.

Western Pleasure: A good pleasure horse has a free-flowing stride of reasonable length in keeping with his confirmation. He/she should cover a reasonable amount of ground with little effort. Ideally, the horse should have a balanced flowing motion, while exhibiting correct gaits that are of the proper cadence. The quality of movement and the consistency of gaits is a major consideration. He should be shown on a reasonably loose rein but with light contact and control, without undue restraint. He should be responsive, yet smooth, in transitions when called for. When asked to extend, he should move out with the same flowing motion. Maximum credit should be given to the flowing, balanced and willing horse that gives the appearance of being fit and a pleasure to ride. Horses must work both ways of the ring at all 3 gaits (walk, jog, lope) to demonstrate their ability with different leads. Horses are required to back easily.

Trail: This class will be judged on the performance of the horse/pony over obstacles, with emphasis on manners, response to the rider and quality of movement. Credit will be given to horses negotiating the course with style and some degree of speed, providing correctness is not sacrificed. Horses should receive credit for showing attentiveness to the obstacles and capability of picking their own way through the course when obstacles warrant it, and willingly responding to the rider's cues on more difficult obstacles. Horses shall be penalized for any unnecessary delay while approaching or negotiating the obstacles. The course must be designed to show all 3 gaits (walk, jog, lope). Pattern to be posted one hour before the class. Exhibitors will have 30 seconds or 3 refusals for each obstacle and then be asked to move on to the next obstacle by signal from the judge.

Western Horsemanship: This class is designed to evaluate the rider's ability to execute, in unison with their horse, a set of maneuvers set by the judge with precision and smoothness while exhibiting poise and confidence, and maintaining a balanced, functional and fundamentally correct body position. The ideal horsemanship pattern is precise with the rider and horse working together, executing each maneuver with subtle aids and cues. It is mandatory that patterns be posted one hour before the class. A rail ride may also be asked to be performed.

Versatile Horse: Class with consist of 3 portions (English pleasure, western pleasure and barrel racing). All clothing and tack changes will be made in the center of the arena with the help of grooms. Horses shall be given a score for each portion but class will be placed as one.

Ranch Horse Pleasure: The purpose of the Ranch Horse Pleasure is to reflect the versatility, attitude and movement of a working horse. The horse's performance should simulate a horse riding outside the confines of an arena and that of a working horse. This horse should show ability to work in a forward, working speed while under control by the rider. Light contact should be rewarded and horse does not have to be shown on a full drape of reins. The overall manners, responsiveness of the horse while performing the maneuver requirements and the horse's quality of movement are the primary considerations. The required maneuvers will include the walk, jog and lope both directions, and the extended jog and lope in at least one direction. As well as stops, turn to change directions and back up. Three optional maneuvers may include side pass, turns of 360 or more, change of lead (simple or flying), and walk, jog or lope over poles. Pattern to be posted one hour before the class.

Maritime Bred Under Saddle: Open to horses and ponies, English or western. Shown as a pleasure class, walk, jog/trot, and lope/canter both ways of the ring. Will be asked to back and stand quietly. Entries will then be asked to strip their tack and line up for judging. Judged on 40% performance and 60% conformation. Western exhibitors show in a halter and English exhibitors in a bridle.

Costume Class: Judged on originality of costume and equipment of horse. Walk only. Open to everyone and riders may be lead.

Toilet Paper Pairs: Open to horses and ponies, English or western. Shown at the walk and jog/trot only, both ways of the ring. A piece of toilet paper will be held between the 2 riders. Exhibitors must work in unison with their partner and not break the toilet paper.

Family Class: Two or more members of the same family. To be judged on neatness, match of dress and suitability as family mounts for pleasure. To walk and jog/trot both ways of the ring. English or western.

Barrels: A timed event, timed on the horse's nose from start to finish. Consists of 3 barrels to be run around in a cloverleaf pattern. Contestants may start by going to either the left or right for the first barrel. A 5 second penalty for each barrel knocked will be incurred and going off pattern with result in a no-time elimination. Riders may compete with more than one mount

Poles: A timed event, with time starting and stopping on the horse's nose. The pattern is run around 6

poles set in a straight line 21' apart, with the first pole being 21' from the start/finish line. Contestant runs the length of the arena alongside the poles, turns around the end pole and weaves back up through them. He then turns the first pole and weaves back through them and again turns the end pole and continues straight back to the finish line. The pattern may be started on either the left or right hand side of the poles. Each pole knocked down will incur a 5 second penalty added to the time. Going off pattern will result in disqualification. Rider may compete with more than one mount.

Keyhole Race: A timed event, timed on the horse's nose from start to finish. Rider races across the start line to the other end of the arena where a keyhole shape is drawn on ground with sawdust (or similar). Rider must enter keyhole, stop and turn around and race out back to finish line without horses feet stepping on or over the sawdust outline.

Dash for Cash: A timed event, timed on the horse's nose start to finish. Rider races across start line to opposite end of the arena, around one barrel and back to the finish line. All the entry fees for this class will be awarded to the 1st place winner. No other cash payouts will be given.

Butterfly Race: 2 sets of 3 poles are set in straight lines 30' from the start line. Rider must race down between the 2 rows of poles in a straight line then weave down through one set, cross over to the 2nd set and weave back up through. Rider then races back to the finish line between the 2 sets of poles. Pattern will be posted.

Crazy 8 Race – 2 barrels will be set 30 feet apart, 50 feet from the start line. Rider races to top barrel and completes a figure 8 around the 2 barrels and then races back to the finish line. Pattern will be posted.

Four Leaf Clover Race – a timed event where riders complete a pattern around 4 barrels.

Egg and Spoon – Riders will complete a pleasure class(walk, trot, lope) which holding a egg on a spoon in one hand. Last rider to lose their egg will be the winner.

MINIATURE HORSE CLASSES

1. Adult Pleasure Driving: Entries to be shown both ways of the arena at a walk, collected trot and a working trot. Horse will enter the ring counter clockwise and immediately pick up a collected trot. Horses will be required to stand quietly and to rein back.
2. Pleasure Driving Stake: Open to all entries that pay a stake fee of \$10.00 per entry. Same requirements as Pleasure Driving above.
3. Roadster Class: Roadsters shall be shown to a bike: horse will enter the ring clockwise and immediately pick up a collected jog. Horses shall be asked to show at a jog trot, roadgait and at a full extended drive on trot. To be judged on performance, speed, quality and manners. Horses will not be asked to rein back.
4. Adult Barrel racing: This is a timed event. Will be required trot through a clover leaf pattern around 3 barrels or cones. An 5 sec penalty for each break in gait after the first.
5. Adult Pole Bending: This is a timed event. Will be required to trot through a pole bending pattern around pylons or poles. 5 sec penalty for each break in gait.
6. Obstacle Course: Horses to be driven through a course of obstacles. Min of 5 max of 8. Course will be posted prior to class. Judged 100% on manner of the horse's performance doing each obstacle. 60 sec time limit to complete each obstacle, 3 refusals calls for a disqualification. Class maybe timed.
7. Reinsmanship: To be judged totally on the driver over a posted course. One entry in the arena at once until everyone does the course and they will be asked to drive on the rail at a walk, collected trot and working trot.
8. Turnout Class: Horses to enter the ring at a collected trot. To be judged at the walk and collected trot both ways of the arena. Entries will line up and be judged on cleanliness and fit of harness and cart: grooming of horse and dress of driver, 60% turnout and 40% performance.
9. Versatility Class: 1st is the pleasure portion of the class. Driven & judged as a pleasure class. At line up, grooms are called in to hold horses. You will then unharness with a 2 min time limit, then grooms exit with the equipment. Entries will compete in the halter phase which is followed by a hunter portion, consisting of 2 jumps only.

1. Entry fee of \$0.50 per exhibit must be sent in with entry. Any entry not accompanied with this fee **will not** be accepted.
2. All exhibitors are asked to please **mark** the wing band numbers of the coop tags before placing the bird in the cage.
3. Birds will be fed and cared for by attendants.
4. The committee has the right to reject any exhibits of inferior quality or those showing signs of disease.
5. Only those breeds mentioned in the American Standard of Perfections will be recognized and the Judge will in all cases be governed by rules of such Standard.
6. Coops will be provided by the exhibition in which all birds must be shown not more than two in a coop, except a trio.
7. In large fowl, classes are provided for: "A" for cock; "B" for hen; "C" for cockerel; and "D" for pullet. In all Bantam and Waterfowl classes there will just be classes for male and female. In Bantam and Waterfowl classes exhibitors are limited to 2 males and 2 females.
8. Poultry will be received up to 9:00 am on Wednesday September 5th but no later. All entries must remain on display until 5:00 pm on Sunday September 9th.

NOVA SCOTIA POULTRY SHOW HEALTH MONITORING POLICY

Poultry shows represent a means of disease spread from flock to flock. With this in mind the Dept of Agriculture has been requested by exhibitors to establish and enforce minimum standards of health at shows under the provincial jurisdiction of the Province of Nova Scotia. For this reason the policy divides poultry according to biological order, and policies vary with orders.

Biological order and species are as follows:

Anseriformes – ducks, geese, etc.

Galliformes – chickens, pheasants, etc.

Columbiformes – pigeons, doves, etc.

1. All birds entered in the show will be individually inspected by the Dept. of Agriculture, Show Supervisor, prior to being placed in their coop.
2. Health Certificate signed by Dept. of Agriculture with wing band number of the bird will accompany all galliforme birds. Out of province birds will bear identifying bands of their provenance or state or origin. The health certificate will indicate all birds in the home of the flock were tested for Pullorum diseases within one year of opening date of show, and that all flock members were vaccinated for Lacryngotracheitis by the eye drop method no less that 30 days or more than 365 days before the opening of the show.
3. No bird may enter the show facilities without the approval of the Dept of Agriculture Show

supervisor.

4. Decision to refuse admittance of an entry to the show because of poor health can be appealed to the Dept. of Agriculture Veterinarian. His/her decision will be final.
5. All mortality and birds showing poor health during the show will be reported by the show manager to the Dept of Agriculture Show Supervisor. The Show Supervisor will inspect these birds and if he feels it is warranted he will remove them from the Show and dispose of them by appropriate methods.
6. Show Management and Exhibitors are responsible for accounting for all birds to Show Supervisor.
7. No bird can be removed from the Show prior to the end of Show without written permission of the Show Supervisor.

1. THE PICTOU NORTH COLCHESTER EXHIBITION assumes no responsibility for loss, theft or injury to any participant, spectator or property caused by the pull.
2. Drivers must hold a valid driver's license.
3. Intoxication will result in disqualification.
4. When truck is being weighed ONLY the driver is allowed in the truck.
5. When hooked to the drag ONLY the driver is allowed in the truck.
6. When the truck is weighed for the correct weight and the height is 26" or less, the truck can go to the staging area. If you leave the staging area you must come back to the scales to verify the weight and hitch height before you are allowed to pull.

4-H EXHIBITION PROGRAM REGULATIONS

1. The purpose of the 4-H program is “To Learn to Do by Doing”. This philosophy should be reflected in all aspects of the Exhibition.
 2. 4-H Day is Wednesday, September 6th, 2017. There is free admission for all 4-H members and leaders who show their 2017 membership card this day.
 3. The 4-H Committee assumes no responsibility for lost or stolen articles.
 4. Only 4-H projects that were judged at local Achievement Days are eligible for entry.
 5. This year’s theme is “Let the Clover be Seen in 2017”. Clubs are encouraged to develop an awareness or educational aspect to their displays. The 4-H theme should also be incorporated into the displays.
 6. All articles should be properly tagged with the member’s name, age and club as well as the class. All ages as of January 1st of the current year.
Junior Members: 9 - 13 years of age;
Senior Members: 14 - 21 years of age;
 7. All projects to be shown in 4-H Classes must be housed in the 4H Buildings for the duration of the exhibition unless otherwise stated.
 8. Homemaking and non-livestock projects will be accepted for judging on Monday, September 4th between 6:00 p.m. and 9:00 p.m. Only Food, Cake Decorating, Garden and Floriculture projects will be accepted on Tuesday, September 5th from 8:30 a.m. to 9:30 a.m. Each article must have a completed, securely attached Exhibition Tag.
 9. **NO ARTICLES WILL BE JUDGED IF THEY ARE NOT IN BY THE TIMES SPECIFIED - NO EXCEPTIONS!**
 10. Livestock displays may be set up on Monday, September 4th from 6:00 - 9:00 p.m.
 11. Non-livestock displays must be set up on Tuesday, September 5th from 5:30 - 9:00 p.m.
 12. Livestock project arrival time is Tuesday, September 5th from 5:00 - 9:00 p.m. Members must provide feeding containers and feed (feed & hay). Also straw if required.
 13. Sickness or injury is not the responsibility of the 4-H committee, however, the committee reserves the right to contact a veterinarian at the expense of the owner should an emergency arise.
 14. The schedule of events is semi-flexible, however, classes will not be held for longer than five minutes.
 15. All items (livestock and non-livestock) must be removed on Sunday, September 10th at 5pm. There are no exceptions to this rule. All areas (livestock and non-livestock) are to be completely cleaned out. Prize money will be withheld if all areas are not clean.
General leaders will be mailed a detailed listing of all classes, sections, prize money and a schedule of events.
